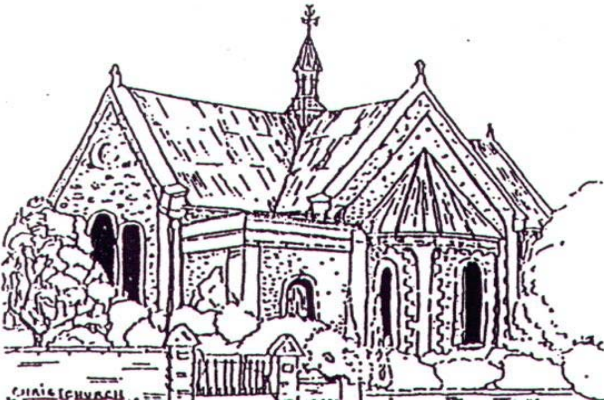

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Geoff and Isobel Eastick have been enjoying the company of their daughter, Jennifer who has been visiting home from England.

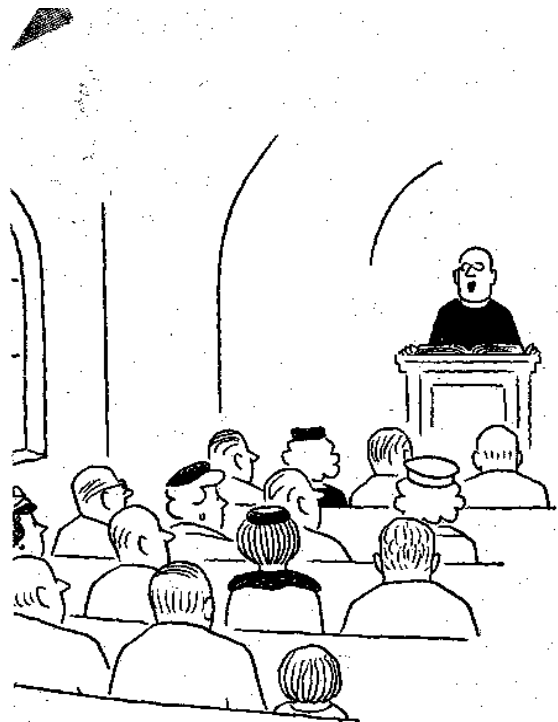


The Parish Prayer

From the Select Vestry:

Of matters new and those continuing to be dealt with:

- A new wire 'loop' is to be placed in the church, to improve the transmission of speech for those who use hearing aids in the church;
- The matter of establishing a Music Trust has moved ahead, and now is in the hands of the Taxation Office seeking approval for a tax exempt status; for the Fund.
- The refurbishment of the property at Medindie has run into some difficulties. Various works need to be completed before the matter of letting the property can be undertaken;
- New sub-committees to support the work of the Select Vestry have been put in place: Finance, Governance, and Buildings and Grounds;
- The work of re-pointing the exterior of the apse wall is expected to be put in hand at the earliest opportunity—weather being a factor;
- In August, the members of the Select Vestry will be engaged on an 'Away Day', together with the members of the Clergy Team.
- The renovations at the Rectory are now nearing completion. The enlarged kitchen will be a boon to the family.

The Story behind the Saint

A series concerned with 'minor' saints

Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153)

Bernard was a Frenchman, born of noble parents, both of whom died when he was still a young man—his father while on a Crusade. At the age of 22, Bernard, with thirty other young noblemen, entered the monastery of Citeaux. Three years later, Bernard was instructed to found a new House, which he did at Clairvaux. It became one of the principal monastic Houses of his Order.

Before long, Bernard was one of the most influential religious forces in Europe. It was he who drew up the Rule for the new order of Knights Templar. It is said that he knew the whole of the New Testament by heart.

Bernard was, above all else, a monk. The austerities and self-mortification which he practised, drew upon him the remonstrations of his friends who feared for his health. In his *De Diligendo Deo*, one of the most outstanding of all medieval books on mysticism, he insisted that God should be loved simply and purely because he is God. Later (in another work) he wrote "Remove free-will and there is nothing to be saved; remove grace and there is left no means of saving. The work of salvation cannot be accomplished without the co-operation of the two."

In his age he denounced the persecution of the Jews. He insisted that: prayer, preaching, and the life of self-denial and worship should be the 'militia' of Church and State, monk and layman alike.

The Story behind the Hymn

Dear Lord and Father of mankind

This hymn was the runner-up in the 2005 BBC “Songs of Praise” survey to find the nation’s most popular hymn. It began life as part of an 1827 poem by the American Quaker, J. G. Whittier, “The Brewing of Soma”. In 17 stanzas, Whittier mocked the ancient Vedic priests and their followers, who made a hallucinogenic brew called ‘Soma’, with lines such as these:

As in the child-world's early year,
Each after age has striven
By music, incense, vigils drear,
And trance, to bring the skies more near,
Or lift men up to heaven!

The stanzas in our hymnal contrast the silent worship of Quakers with the noisy ritual of other forms of worship. But it wasn’t ancient Vedic worship that Whittier had in mind; it was the noisy enthusiasm of Christian churches. Ironically, congregations sing the lines extracted from Whittier’s tirade with the sort of gusto that he condemned.

In 1924 G R Stocks, the music master at Repton School in Derbyshire, took the tune of a contralto aria in Hubert Parry’s oratorio “Judith” and made it fit by repeating the last line of each stanza. And if you want to hear another version of it, listen to it played by The Royal Scots Dragoon Guards on their CD “Spirit of the Glen: Journey”.

The Sanctuary Guild

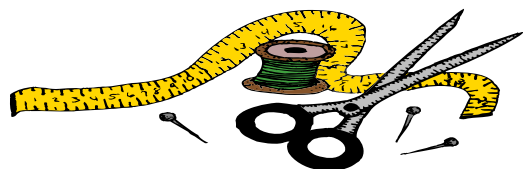

SUPPORT ABM The Anglican Board of Mission—Australia MARTYR'S DAY

In 1942 the Australian people faced the greatest crisis in their history since European settlement.

The Imperial Forces of Japan had invaded New Guinea and were intent on doing the same to Australia. In New Guinea, there were based missionaries, sponsored by ABM, and thirteen of them were captured by the invading force and killed.

Amongst those killed at that time was a lady from Adelaide, Miss Lilla Lashmar, who had been a teacher in the Parish School of St Cuthbert's, Prospect.

Each year, on the 2nd September, the 'New Guinea Martyrs' (as they became known) are remembered when the Holy Eucharist is celebrated at St Cuthbert's.

The Archbishop will be the Celebrant for the Eucharist and the Preacher will be The Rev'd Dr Theo McCall, Senior Chaplain at St Peter's College.

A light supper will follow the service (people bring a plate to share) and everyone is invited to share in this important commemoration of those who were faithful to their Lord when the darkness of the Cross overshadowed them.
